Royal Thai Army Considers LITACS Purchase

Delegation Visits DSD as Part of Evaluation Process

A delegation from the Royal Thai Army Field Artillery C³I Evaluation Committee, headed by Major General Paiboon Kanchanapiboon, committee chairman and commanding general of the RTA's Field Artillery Center located in Lopburi, Thailand, visited Data Systems from May 10 - 14, 1998 to evaluate the Division's ability to produce the Lightweight Integrated Tactical Artillery Command and Control System (LITACS). Major General Paiboon was accompanied by 9 officers representing various RTA staff agencies and the field artillery user and doctrinal communities: Special Colonel Prasert Kesuwan, Chief of Staff, RTA Field Artillery Center; Colonel Sompong Mukdasakul, Deputy Chief of Staff, RTA Field Artillery Center; Colonel Jongruk Jamjan, Staff Officer, RTA Operations Directorate; Colonel Jakravudh Somphee, RTA Field Artillery Division; LTC Vitaya Piamsuwan, RTA Comptroller's Office; LTC Tepjit Chanda, RTA R&D Office; LTC Surasak Pukun, RTA Artillery Center; LTC Thanongsak Rongtim, Staff Officer, RTA Logistics Directorate; and Major Chadwit Putsomyothin, RTA Signal Department.

Also joining the RTA delegation were DSD's consultants from Thailand: Mr. Ed Corcoran, Asia Connections, Inc.; and Mr. Phairatna Jarupongsa and Mr. Jamikom Manasilp representing Global Technology & Ex-Im Co., Ltd. Major Carl Godman, official representative of the Joint U.S. Military Advisory Group, Thailand, (JUSMAGTHAI) accompanied the RTA visitors during their stay in the United States.

California was the last stop on the group's 14 day round-the-world swing, and followed factory tours in Israel and France and a visit to Istanbul, Turkey arranged by Litton's competition.

An initial battalion set of LITACS was sold to Thailand in 1994 via the U.S. Army Foreign Military Sales system. Since that time, LITACS has proven highly successful in many training exercises and evaluations against foreign competitive systems, most notably from Israel and France. The RTA has been

steadily evaluating each competing system as part of a major procurement initiative to equip all of its fire support force with a standard automated artillery fire control system.

In February 1998, DSD participated in a two-week field test of these competing systems. LITACS was graded for its technical and tactical fire control capabilities and its ease of operation and maintainability, as well as its ability to withstand typical Thailand environmental conditions. After the testing was completed, LITACS was judged to be leading its two prime competitors.

The RTA's final decision also requires a comprehensive evaluation of each company's production facilities, its ability to manage and support its system in the field, and procurement costs. So, after a warm welcome by Data

Systems' president, Allen E. Powers, General Paiboon and his entourage were given detailed briefings on Litton's field artillery expertise, our extensive background as a major systems supplier for the U.S. armed forces, and extensive laboratory demonstrations of LITACS and its electronic interfaces with standard U.S. Army fire support systems also manufactured by DSD. The group also traveled to our San Diego manufacturing operation, where they viewed our wide array of ruggedized computers and displays and took a thorough tour of our production facilities.

A highlight of the trip was a video-conference that took place on May 11 between the RTA delegation and members of the U.S. Army's field artil-

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lery doctrinal community at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. During the VTC, Colonel Dan Bonney, assigned to the U.S. Army Field Artillery Center & School, elaborated on U.S. Army field artillery standard systems and LITACS' complete inter-operability with those systems. He also commented on the vastly improved power and accuracy of LITACS compared to foreign competition

The RTA visit was not 'all work and no play.' The delegation toured attractions in Los Angeles and

San Diego, including a visit to Sea World. General Paiboon commented that the trip to Sea World was a memorable occasion for him personally and capped a very successful and insightful visit to Litton Data Systems and to Southern California.

Standards of Conduct: Political Contributions

This month's article is on Political Contributions, item 11 in Data Systems' "Standards of Conduct. Litton's Data Systems Division has established a policy which prohibits the Division from making political contributions in violation of any applicable law or regulation. This includes contributions which are made to political parties or individual candidates, foreign or domestic Contributions include, but are not limited to, money, property and service donations, and the purchase of tickets to fund-raising events. This policy does not restrict individual employee contributions or political activity. For instance, this policy does not apply to contributions to registered political action committees, such as the Litton Employees Political Assistance Committee (LEPAC). It is important to note that these contributions are made by an employee and never by the Division. The Division is prohibited from using intermediaries to make political contributions on behalf of the Division; and employees are prohibited from seeking reimbursement from the Division for personal contributions. Employees are required to report any perceived violation of this Standard to Division management. Any questions

Litton Awarded \$138.6 Million U.S. Navy Contract

The U.S. Navy Sea Systems Command awarded Litton Integrated Systems (Guidance and Control Systems and Sperry Marine) a \$138.6 million firm-fixed price contract for the design and manufacture of Engineering Control Systems Equipment and Integrated Bridge Systems (IBSs) for backfit on U.S. Navy Ticonderoga (CG 47) class of AEGIS cruisers. The contract includes a firm requirement for four systems, options for 22 additional systems and pricing agreements for IBSs for the DDG 51 class of destroyers. Work will be performed primarily by Guidance and Control, with assistance from Sperry Marine, in Northridge, California; Charlottesville, Virginia; San Diego, California; and Pascagoula, Mississippi, and is expected to be complete by December 2003.

New Kester Solder Product Wins Excellence Award

A new Kester Solder polymer product that does double duty in the micro-electronic interconnection market was presented with an award for excellence in electronics packaging and production at the Nepron West trade show in Anaheim, California. The product, SECURE™ 9101 Reflow Encapsulant, was cited by Electronic Packaging & Production magazine, a trade publication for the electronics manufacturing industry. A completely new material, it changes the way micro-electronic interconnections are made. The award was Kester's second in 12 months in the polymer product category.

Ingalls To Build More Vessels for the Oil Industry in \$30 Million Deal

Ingalls Shipbuilding signed a contract worth more than \$30 million to build four multi-purpose jackup vessels for SEAREX, Inc., of Mandeville, Louisiana for use by the petroleum industry to support offshore exploration, drilling and production projects. The vessels, 165 feet long with a 140-foot beam, will be equipped with three 260-foot legs

In the Spotlight

Last month's mystery employee, **Don Maxwell**, has been with Data Systems since last May. If you think you've seen him around for longer than that, you're right! However, he served only two months before being one of several hundred released by the Government with honorable discharges.

Don met his wife, Lorna, a teacher at White Oak Elementary, through a Christian dating service in 1993. Don says he hopes his co-workers think his work ethic and sense of humor are the most important assets he brings to the workplace.

Litton Announces Third Quarter Results

Litton Industries reported results for its third quarter and the first nine months of fiscal 1998, ended April 30. Net income for the first quarter and first nine months rose 12% and 11% respectively over comparable periods of fiscal 1997. Sales during the third quarter were \$1.143 billion, an increase of 4% over the prior year's third quarter. Nine month sales were \$3.156 billion, or 2% higher than in the nine month period of the previous fiscal year.

On April 1, 1998, Litton acquired TASC, Inc., a leading provider of information technology and services in the national intelligence sector, the Department of Defense and non-defense and commercial customers. The acquisition significantly broadened Litton's market coverage in both the federal information technology and commercial markets worldwide. □

LES Wins Y2K Pacts for Nuclear Power Facilities
