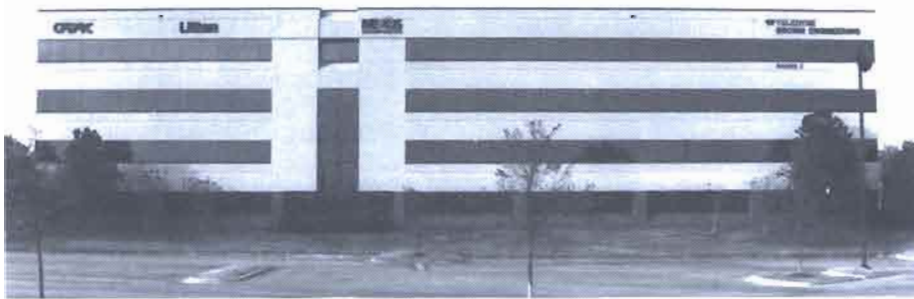

Litton Dedicates New Huntsville Facility



The new Litton facility in Huntsville, Alabama is currently shared

by Data Systems and PRC. Huntsville is home to the Army's Aviation and Missile Command and is considered a center of excellence for surface-to-surface and surface-to-air weaponry.

Members of Litton Industries' senior management, including Alden V. Munson, Senior Vice President and Group Executive, Information Systems Group, Data Systems President Allen E. Powers and William Webb, PRC Senior Vice President and General Manager, Defense Systems, announced Litton's plans for expansion in Huntsville, Alabama during an Open House at the new Litton facility there on April 7, 1998. Local dignitaries on hand for the event included U.S. Representative Bud Cramer, Huntsville Mayor Loretta Spencer, Mike Gillespie, Chairman of the Madison County Commission, Linda Green, Chair of the Board of the Huntsville Chamber of Commerce and Eugene Crum, Economic Development Director of the Alabama Development Office.

Litton's presence in Huntsville currently includes Data Systems, PRC and the newly acquired TASC, Inc. for a total of approximately 50 employees. That number is expected to double based on Litton's belief that Huntsville is a growth area offering a wealth of opportunities for defense contractors

Most of the ten DSD employees presently located in Huntsville are there in support of THAAD. John Rogers, the program manager in charge of the Huntsville office, expects a significant increase in that number over the next twelve months as the THAAD program matures. In addition, Huntsville, considered to be a center of excellence for surface-to-surface and surface-to-air weaponry, is home to the Army's Aviation and Missile Command (AMCOM), which manages an annual contracting budget of \$5 billion.

According to Data Systems' Vice President of Business Development Frank Tullis, "Huntsville is an extremely important market for Data Systems Division. The new Aviation and Missile Command is the largest acquisition agency in the Army, and we need to maintain a significant presence with this customer. The intent to expand operations in Huntsville has been a division strategic objective for the last two years. In the near term, THAAD, MEADS, Software Systems and Engineering Support (SSES) and logistics initiatives are providing the springboard for growth in the Huntsville market." □

Another Division Proposal In Work Data Systems Builds Another Team for C2 Success

Been wondering why you have to use your key card more when you're in Building 1 these days? Or why some conference rooms are "off limits" for the time being? Well, just put it down to another big proposal effort that's going on from now until some time in July, when it'll finally go out the door.

Jim Murray is the Business Development Program Director for International Theater Air Systems and the Program Director for the KC4IS proposal to deliver a command, control, communications, computer and intelligence system to Kuwait. He has been conducting a briefing every morning at 8:30 to keep everybody up to speed. And with domain specialists from Data Systems' Engineering, Business Development and Program Management organizations, as well as outside company team members, it's a *major meeting every time*.

Our team members for KC4IS were selected from three major allies in the 1991 Gulf War coalition — Boeing Information and Communications Systems Division from the US; GEC Marconi Radar and Defence Systems Division from United Kingdom, and Matra Systems & Information Division from France.

The proposed command, control, communications, computers and intelligence (C4I) system with short-range radars will utilize the expertise and best-available off-the-shelf hardware and software solutions from these internationally known companies. Litton's team also includes partnerships with smaller in-country companies, who will provide the Kuwaiti civil works, communications, installations and maintenance and training services. The KC4IS proposal's administration is being handled as usual by the able people in the Business Development Center and Steven Meyers & Associates. According to Murray, formal submission of the proposal to the customer will take place in July, and contractor selection is expected by the Fall of 1998.

The Litton/American Express office has a new home! For the past 4 years, the travel office has occupied offices at Data Systems in Agoura Hills. Space considerations at DSD necessitated moving twice in the past year and, thus, this was an opportunity for Litton to identify a permanent travel office. Over the past 6 months, Litton Corporate, Data Systems and American Express searched for an appropriate space. The selected site is the Premier America Federal Credit Union building. The travel office's new address is 19867 Prairie Street, #161, Chatsworth.

Relocation occurred on February 20, 1998. The SABRE computer sets and telephone systems were moved February 19 and 20. Early Saturday morning, Bekins sent a team of 6 burly men to the DSD location. Most of the move was routine for Bekins — however, the

challenges came in getting very heavy safes on and off the trucks!!! American Express provided the refreshments.

Being collocated with the credit union has some distinct advantages: excellent access to the Northridge Mall and to ATMs that accept American Express cards! The building has just started leasing space to tenants, so credit union employees are getting used to sharing their space.

The Litton/American Express office provides travel services to Data Systems, Aero Products, Corporate, Guidance and Control Systems, Applied Technology, Solid State, Electro Optical Systems, Amecom and Litton Enterprise Solutions. By utilizing the services of American Express under a consolidated travel contract, these divisions take advantage of Litton combined buying power with the airlines.

American Express provides a consistent high quality of service which is monitored by the divisional travel managers. In addition, many of the divisions utilize American Express' Corporate Card program for their travelers.

The new office houses a staff of 13, including travel consultants averaging 10 years of experience. Customer Service Representative Gil Lujan, Team Leader Wayne Topping and Manager Susan Giobbi. Telephone system and support is provided by Data Systems. The credit union is responsible for maintenance.

AVR Commuter Survey Results

During the week of March 30, 1998, Data Systems' Agoura Hills and Moorpark-based employees completed AVR/Transportation Survey forms indicating

their work commute travel patterns the preceding week. This annual survey, requested by Division management, helps update the employee transportation data base used for the reporting requirements under the South Coast Air Quality Management District's (SCAQMD) Rule 2202 and Ventura County's Air Pollution Control District's (VCAPCD) Rule 210. Both regulations

govern the Division's program aimed at reducing the number of employee vehicle trips being made during peak commuting periods.

Results from this year's survey show Data Systems' ridesharing levels remain at 1.14 in Agoura and slightly increased to 1.19 in Moorpark. Both levels fall short of the goals of 1.5 set by the SCAQMD and 1.35 set by the VCAPCD. □

Litton Newsbriefs

PRC Awarded \$150 Million ID/IQ U.S. Navy Contract

The Training and Simulation Division of the U.S. Navy's Naval Air Warfare Center in Orlando, Florida awarded PRC a \$150 million Indefinite Delivery/Indefinite Quantity (ID/IQ) contract for the General Aviation Instructional Systems Development program, a 5 year effort expected to bring Litton over \$50 million in revenues. The contract requires training course maintenance, instructional systems development and modification enhancement of training devices across the broad spectrum of the aviation community. Program management, studies and analysis will also be provided including support for the full range of training data products prescribed by Military Training Program standards.

Imagery and Mapping Contract Valued at About \$80 Million

TASC received a contract from Science Applications International Corporation (SAIC) to provide engineering services and technology innovation to the National Imagery and Mapping Agency (NIMA). Estimated to be worth \$330 million, the NIMA Systems Engineering Services Contract will provide complete system integration and engineering services to support the U.S. Imagery and Geospatial Information Systems (USIGS) and its programs. Litton's portion of the program is estimated to be worth approximately \$80 million over the 5 year contract performance period. The U.S. Imagery and Geospatial Information System will allow NIMA's customers in the defense and intelligence communities to gain and maintain an "information edge" in future conflicts, natural disasters and international crises.

Aero Products Opens China Support Center

Aero Products has opened a support center in Beijing for its Asian customers. The Litton Worldwide Services, Inc. operation will supply maintenance and engineering support for the Litton LTN-101 Flagship® navigation system for Airbus commercial jetliners. China Southern Airlines, Sichuan Airlines, Silk Air and Zheijang Airlines have selected the system for their A319, A320 and A321 aircraft. □
