### Air Combat Command Visits Data Systems

On October 27, Business Development hosted an important visit from Colonel Steve Savage, the U.S. Air Force's Air Combat Command (ACC) Director of C2 Intelligence, Surveillance, Reconnaissance (C2ISR) Systems Operations Division, and his assistant, Lieutenant Colonel Bruce Sturk. Colonel Savage's office is directly responsible for training, organizing and equipping the Air Force and National Guard Ground Tactical Air Control System (GTACS) units. A full day of briefings and demonstrations was scheduled to provide the officers with up-to-date information for their consideration in developing and revising the GTACS Modernization Roadmap and investment strategy. The day's activities included status updates on the P3I, R/SAOC, and OAADS programs, an overview of our TYQ-23 (V) 4 Common Baseline approach and hands-on access to the TYQ-82 and the OCU laptop display of TYQ-23 data. The briefings and demonstrations generated lively discussions about how present-day technology can meet GTACS requirements in 2005.

At the day's conclusion, Colonel Savage voiced his satisfaction with the day's activities and said he would try to arrange for other significant staff members, as well as key general officers, to visit us for familiarization with our products. □

## DSD to Produce Displays for Thermal Omnibus Contract

Data Systems has been selected as a subcontractor to produce more than 6,600 Display Control Modules for Raytheon's Driver's Vision Enhancement systems under the three-year, \$107.5 million multi-year Thermal Omnibus contract the U.S. Army awarded to Raytheon Systems. Deliveries will begin in mid-1999 and Litton's work will initially be worth \$5.1 million, with potential for additional contracts of up to 8,000 systems.

The Display Control Module is one of two major components of the Driver's Vision Enhancement system and will be manufactured at Data Systems-San Diego's state-of-the-art, cellular manufacturing facilities. □

## Italian Air Force Students Complete Successful Training

The final steps of integration and testing are now underway on Data Systems' contract with the Italian Air Force to develop, manufacture, test and deliver two AN/TYQ-23 Operations Modules customized to adapt to the Italian unique radars and operating environment with the system name Air Surveillance and Tactical Control Center (CCTA) Components of the Italian Air Force Command and Control System (C2M).

During the past two months, two groups of eight Italian Air Force (IAF) students, commanded by Captain Giorgio Pappalepore, have been attending Operators and Maintenance training courses at Litton's Agoura Hills facility. Each of these 12-week classes are accelerated and comprehensive and are based on similar AN/TYQ-23 courses developed and presented by Litton Data Systems' Training Department to the U.S. Air Force and Marine Corps. Training has proceeded very successfully, with the students citing an appreciation of the capabilities of the system, the training material and

tors Steve Myers and Tom Gafford. Thanks also go to Gary Effertz who participated during course preparation.

The students have made the most of their weekends, seeing and doing more in their short time in the United States than most natives have. On their first weekend, they drove to San Francisco, followed by a trip to the Grand Canyon on the next weekend, then Universal Studios, then Las Vegas, then San Diego/Tijuana, Palm Springs... and so on. 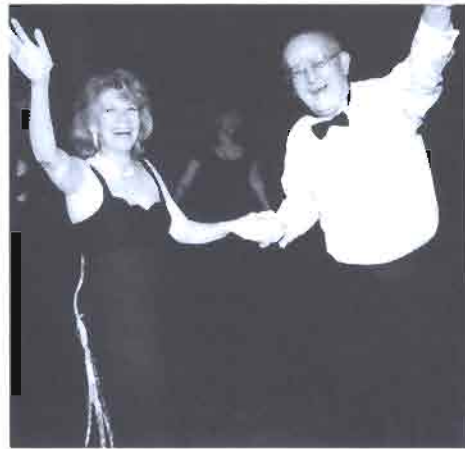

## First CECOM/Litton Partnership Meeting in San Diego

On October 7, key senior management members from the U.S. Army's Communications-Electronics Command (CECOM), including Major General Robert Nabors, paid a special visit to Litton Data Systems - San Diego. This visit marked the second meeting to discuss Litton's and CECOM's business partnership, which was conceived by CECOM at the request of Litton President and Chief Executive Officer Michael Brown. The purpose of the San

Diego meeting was to direct the alliance members and conduct the first Litton hosted, semi-annual meeting since the pact was enacted in February of this year. Bill Coates, DSD-SD Director of Engineering, together with Paul Wickliffe, Director of Army Business Development in New Jersey, gave product demonstrations to the CECOM executives in attendance. ## Unwelcome Visitor in Ocean Springs?

We've all heard about legendary southern hospitality, but DSD employees at the Ocean Springs facility were not feeling very hospitable when Hurricane Georges recently paid a visit.

After slowly making his way from Puerto Rico through the Dominican Republic, Cuba and Key West, Georges made landfall in Ocean Springs shortly after dark on Sunday, September 27. In keeping with company policy, Georges entered the main visitor's lobby to sign in and announced his presence by breaking several picture windows and sending everything that wasn't nailed down flying through the air. Georges did bring gifts with him, but they were in the form of sustained winds well over 100 miles per hour and torrential rains. The high winds, coupled with ground already saturated by the rain, caused the uprooting of thousands of trees, many of them hundreds of years old, and sent them toppling over onto houses and businesses in the region.

The entire area was without power for several days following the storm, and contaminated water supplies prompted a "boil water" order for the entire Gulf Coast region. Damage to the Ocean Springs facility is estimated at \$150K - but you don't hear many people complaining. Instead, residents are grateful that no lives were lost and property damage was relatively minor.

But getting back to that southern hospitality thing - isn't it remarkable how people come together after a disaster? DSD Mississippi's local sister division, Ingalls Shipbuilding, lost several buildings as a result of the storm, leaving over 300 employees in the Planning Yard Coordination and Logistics Group without a place to work. Within days, the management and employees of DSD devised a plan to provide 83 of these key Ingalls personnel

down went flying as evidenced by this shot of the staircase leading to the lobby from the second floor.

with a new home. Jerry Storey, Operations Manager for DSD, coordinated the effort to relocate approximately 25 DSD employees within the facility to make room for the Ingalls personnel. The massive job of disconnecting and reconnecting all computer hookups, printers, copiers, etc., was accomplished with a minimum of disruption and, one week after the storm, the somewhat tattered facility and its inhabitants welcomed the new residents with open arms!

Also arriving in late September was new General Manager David Johnson. After his first postcard picture perfect, calm-before-the-storm kind of day at the facility, he caught the second to last plane out of town. From the safety and comfort of his Southern California home, he monitored the situation as it unfolded Sunday and Monday. "Having lived through the '94 Northridge earthquake, I knew first hand the fear, anxiety and sense of hopelessness that everyone felt in the face of this devastating force of nature," he said. "Our staff responded selflessly to assess our facility's damage and get us back into operation. We also witnessed an outpouring of support for those who experienced serious property damage. For all of the extraordinary efforts made on behalf of our company and community, a very sincere Thank You." □
